# Blankets for Agape Touching Hearts-Second Open House

Volunteers have been coming from far and near to help make 1500 blankets as Christmas gifts for Agape children. Over fifty volunteers from as far as Big Island, Concord, Northern Virginia, and Vinton have been busy crocheting bor-

ders on fleece blankets. An open house to distribute materials, provide free crochet lessons, or drop-off completed blankets will be held on **Saturday, November 11 from 9 am until noon** at Dwelling Place SML, located at 1019 Hendricks Store Road, Moneta. (under the laundromat – enter at the rear of the building)

"The great thing about this project is that no matter the circumstances in a child's home, these blankets provide a new, personal, warm blanket representing God's love to each child. Many of our volunteers are praying over each blanket as they crochet them," says project organizer, Donna Cosmato.

Volunteers range in age from Thelma Meador at eighty-eight years old to Becca Daniel at nine years old. Becca is in fourth grade and learned to crochet almost a year ago, when she received her first crochet kit for Christmas. Her mother, Shana Daniel, has been teaching her and is very proud of her ability now to create blankets for other children. Shana says, "Most volunteers are surprised to see they don't have to poke holes in the fleece. They just start crocheting; the blanket stitch on the edge of the fleece blankets makes it easy to connect the yarn to the fleece." She first heard about the project through her church, Radford Baptist.




