### Same Sex Attraction Presentation Helps Mentors' Understanding

Over twenty mentors and floor supervisors attended a special educational presentation by Michelle Ramaker to increase awareness and understanding of same sex attraction (SSA). Michelle is a part of the Celebrate Recovery ministry and struggled for years with same sex attraction. Agape mentors are not counselors so the purpose was to increase our ability to listen with understanding to those dealing with same sex attraction. Jan Hogle, Mentor Administrator and organizer of the program, said, "Agape mentors are trusted and safe people, following the leading of the Holy Spirit, as we come alongside our clients to listen to, love on and pray for them, desiring, as our mission statement says, to draw them closer to Christ."

Michelle says, "I grew up in a strong Christian home. I had a very good understanding of my beliefs. Even with that foundation, when I was 15 I found myself in a relationship with a married woman who was older than I. After the relationship ended, my life was in unfamiliar ground, and I continued to struggle for the next several years. During that time, I got married and began having children, still while battling same sex attraction. Finally, after ten years of questioning God and wondering why this happened to me, I began to understand, through God's guidance, how and why a Christian battles this. I am now trying to help others understand same sex attraction. This is a calling that God has clearly placed on my life, and one that I will faithfully carry out."

Michelle described the difference between the inclination toward SSA and the choice to act on it. She described that even as a solid Christian, she was on a journey based on self-deception resulting in sin that was destructive in many ways. She believes the key to her victory over SSA was her faith and the faith of others who loved her unconditionally. She described her victory over SSA as similar to victory over any other sin or addiction.



# **Geology Background Serves Agape Well!**

One of the blessings of Agape is the variety of talents and skills that God brings together to make this a professional, cohesive ministry that operates better than private industry!

When Jeff Turner graduated with a degree in geology, he couldn't have imagined where such a specialty would lead. He initially worked creating maps for the Department of Defense. While working for the government he earned his masters degree in Geodesy, and entered the field of Geographic Information Systems (GIS). Through the years he worked for the Government, private industry, and eventually formed numerous companies tackling challenging projects as diverse as developing a children's educational CD-ROM for the Smithsonian Institution to providing technical 3D maps around the world.

In 2009, when his son Taylor turned 17, they traveled throughout the fifty states in fifty consecutive days, fishing at the most historic fishing spots (streams, rivers, lakes) in each state, raising nearly \$10,000 for various Christian ministries. The funds were raised by friends, family, and well-wishers by each person gifting a nickel for every fish they caught which eventually totaled 956 fish. Besides researching the best fishing hole for each state, they were challenged with mapping a nationwide route that could be achieved in 50 days. Notable sponsors for this event included ESPN, Wrangler, and Chick-Fil-A.

Recently, the Member Church Guide, used by mentors to refer clients to Agape's Member Churches, was being updated, and Jeff asked Carol Moyer, the Member Church Liaison, if consideration had been given to creating a map showing the locations of the Member Churches. Within a few hours, Jeff had created the map shown, a great resource for easily identifying locations of each of Agape's churches.

### Three for One!

When Karen Doyle saw an opportunity to volunteer at Agape, a ministry close to her home, she was thrilled. She is always looking for ways to serve our Lord, and already does this 365 days a week as she and her husband, Matt, care for two intellectually disabled (ID) women in their home, Marta Clifton and Betty Crigger. Finding activities and projects in the community is an ongoing search.

In-home care giving is a family tradition, as Karen's sister, sister-in-law and nieces have also provided care for ID patients through Wall Residences of Floyd, Virginia. Karen and Matt have been doing this since Karen retired from 25 years of service to the US Postal Service five years ago. Marta, who is also physically disabled, has been with the Doyles five years and Betty has been with them for about six months.

Matt, who works full time with the US Postal Service, is a big part of the care giving, and their daughter, Emily, recently moved

back home to be a part of the care giving team. This has been particularly helpful with Marta's physical disabilities.

In addition to working in clothing at Agape every week, Karen and Emily take the ladies to the library to get books,

they go to Bingo events, the YMCA to work out, and one of their favorite activities is going to the SPCA and petting the cats. Having Emily take the ladies out for an afternoon allows Karen the time to complete the required paperwork. There are also some churches that provide monthly programs for ID, and at home they do many crafts, including sending hand-stamped cards to people who are sick or need encouragement, enjoys creating interesting projects for the ladies, including visiting friends, painting bird houses, watching movies, and visiting the gravesite of Betty's mother. Marta and Betty are avid travelers, and especially enjoy going to Matt's hunting cabin where they relax by the fire, ride 4-wheelers and fish. They also get involved in church activities at the Doyle's church, EastLake Community Church, and at Betty's church in Roanoke. Karen says, "They are part of the family and we take them everywhere with us." The Doyles are truly an example of serving Jesus through serving others, 24/7.
