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# "My Primary Doctor was God!"

A year ago, Rachel Mooneyham had ninety percent of her cardiac arteries blocked. She said, "The doctors didn't know how I even survived, and I told them it was because of God. They were going to try some additional stents, but ultimately the doctor said the only option was open heart surgery. I wasn't too excited about that option, but took it to God in prayer."

After praying about it, she continued, "God told me to go ahead. I had peace about it going into surgery, and when I was in recovery, I remembered everything and recognized everyone. In fact, the only pain pill I took was so I could sleep, due to all the commotion in my room!"

"That was the moment that I truly understood I could entrust myself to Him. I had walked with Jesus since I was a child, but I've been the caregiver for everyone — my parents, my husband, his parents, and now, I was the one needing care. And I received that from Jesus! The nurses wondered why I didn't need pain pills, and I was able to tell them, 'God's got this one!'"

I was baptized with my mom when I was nine, and looking back, I realize I couldn't have made it without Him. He's my rock. When my husband died in March, 2016, God was there with me."

Rachel concluded, "I've been coming to Agape since 2014, and find this to be such a caring group of people. The items I receive from Agape are always nice, but the mentoring is the most important thing I get at Agape. I would come for the mentoring even if there was nothing else to receive here."

## Roanoke Valley Gives Campaign Nets \$12K for Forklift



Roanoke Valley Gives (RVG) is an annual 24-hour on-line fundraiser run by the Community Foundation serving western Virginia. Over 150 charities (including the Agape Center) throughout the Roanoke Valley participate in the Give Big Day campaign each year. Last year, the Agape Center purchased a new refrigeration unit with the donations collected.

Rick Cocrane, Coordinator of the Agape Campaign, said, "This year, the Agape Center collected an amazing \$11,810 that went toward the purchase of a fork-lift. This forklift was badly needed to increase our warehouse space. We can no longer expand horizontally so must begin storing goods high on shelves. The fork-lift will also prevent injuries from our volunteers lifting heavy objects."

In this year's Give Big campaign on March 13, Agape had seven additional do-

nors (55) compared to last year and finished 8th of 48 charities in the medium sized category and 19th overall (out of 150 Roanoke Valley charities).

Rick concluded, "This is an impressive showing for our second year in the RVG campaign. Due to the success we've had over the last two years, the RVG Give Big Day event will become Agape's annual individual fundraising event. We appreciate the donations that our supporters made to Agape through the Roanoke Valley Gives campaign and look forward to doing it again next March."




Mandy also gives to the community through her involve-

As a part of this global effort, local Lions check the strength of the eyeglasses; purify and clean them; bag them according to lens strength, and then they are shipped to countries where they will be put to good use..

Mandy says, "It is the service aspect of the Lions which drew me to them. They have become like family to me. When I was in a severe car accident a couple of years ago, they brought food, cards, and cheer to me while I recovered."

In 1964 a woman disguised as a nurse entered a hospital in Chicago and kidnapped a baby boy named Paul Fronczak. Two years, later, a child was found abandoned and was returned to the Fronczak family.

Paul began tracing his roots from birth to adulthood and finally found evidence that he actually had a twin sister named Jill. His name was really Jack Rosenthal. His father had abandoned the family. The mother and children disappeared soon after and no one in the family knew what had happened to them. Evidently, Marie, the mother, had abandoned Jack and then disappeared along with Jill, his twin sister.

Jack Rosenthal was his true identity but legally he is still Paul Joseph Fronczak. He says, "I wish peace, love and safety for Jill, wherever she is and for the real Paul. I wish it for everyone who wakes up one day and finds that they are lost."

A gripping story of a man's struggles to find out who he really is; one who is still praying he will one day know the facts of his own life.
