

Mentor Bill Horvath with client Cole Follin, who has become a follower of Christ and is checking out churches in his area.





Getting Ahead Grads Hold Reunion: Support for the Journey

Community Representatives Offer Support to Help GA Grads Achieve Goals

Experts provided "Support for the Journey" as the Getting Ahead graduates gathered to hear from community professionals who provide resources to help support and achieve their goals. The Graduates shared how they were progressing on their goals, including a paid-off car, exercising more, eating better, losing weight, enrolling in classes and taking more control of their lives and the aspects they can impact. Several of the grads were unable to make the meeting because they had started new jobs! Each grad has been assigned a mentor who has had specific training in the GA program, the goal-setting, and how to encourage and hold their clients accountable. "Providing ongoing support for each graduate is a significant aspect of the program, and we are thrilled with the mentors who have taken on this additional responsibility and training to walk along-side our grads and help them to continue to pursue their goals and support them in their new or renewed relationship with Jesus," said Jan Hogle, Co-Facilitator of the GA program.

Agape Clients Make Presentations to Community Groups

Judy Caldwell's story in the October issue of the *Agape Newsletter* came to the attention of Peggy Overstreet, program chair for the Roanoke Valley Gideons, an organization that provides Bibles throughout the world. Judy had shared with readers how after an attempted suicide, she was in the hospital and found a Bible in her bed-side stand, placed there by the Gideons. Though Judy had grown up knowing Jesus, she had allowed her life to be consumed by other things, putting Him on the back burner. Through various circumstances, she was ready to come back to God's family and the Bible she found showed her the way. In her story, she had said, "I'll tell my story to anyone, anywhere", and now she has been able to make good on that commitment as she thanked the Gideons personally for their often unseen work of keeping Bibles in the hands of people all over the world. Congratulations Judy!

Kim Wright grew up in Bedford County, and started drinking and using drugs at age 14. Married for 26 years, her husband passed away in 2005, leaving her feeling alone and hopeless. "Over the years, I became depressed about my own medical issues and felt I had nothing to live for. I was admitted to the mental health unit at UVA in April 2015."

It was while she was in the hospital that Kim had a spiritual awakening. Though she had been raised in a church-going home, she had never believed she was worthy of the God she heard about. One night, "I awoke and my room was glowing. An angel was telling me that everything was going to be ok. It was the first time I felt such calm. I was overcome with a sense that I was indeed safe and secure and that God was present, even though I was wasted. I realized God still had a purpose for my life, and now I was ready to follow Him."

She continued, "After 44 years of dependence, God took away my desire for alcohol and drugs. I have been clean for one year and eight months, and I haven't had the desire one time. I truly feel that He has been with me every step of this journey."

Kim was able to get disability for fibromyalgia, but couldn't afford to continue living in Charlottesville; she decided to return to Bedford and the mountain views! "I feel like this is where God wants me to be, and for the first time in my life I feel happy. It is a wonderful feeling. And after taking the Getting Ahead program, I

am beginning to see how God might be able to use me! I want to talk to as many people as I can, share my story, and if I talk to enough people, perhaps I can influence one to turn, or return, to God."

Kim has been coming to Agape almost a year, and just graduated from the Getting Ahead program. She says, "It is the best thing that I've done. I now have several friends who are like family to me. It is so great to have friends who understand what I'm going through. I was able to attend every single class, except for one, which I made up. Getting up and keeping a commitment was a big step for me, as I never know when I wake up how my body will feel that day. But God kept me involved.

She continued, "I am very uncomfortable asking for help. I was one who made donations to food banks, and I never dreamed that I might need help someday myself. From the time I walked into Agape, I have felt lots of love, and acceptance. The volunteers make it very easy and comfortable to be here. I am so grateful and blessed that I want to others by giving back. I hope to become a volunteer at Agape myself. I love my life, and I could never say that before!. Every day I praise God for where I am in my life right now."
