Flying Chickens Couldn't Keep Her From GA Class

Twelve Agape clients have proven their commitment to Getting Ahead (GA) by participating in three-hour classes twice a week and doing hours of homework since October. Their training will culminate with a graduation ceremony on December 12. Each person will give presentation on the impact the class has had on them and what they have learned. Excitement is already building for the next GA class, which will begin on February 6, with applications being submitted during January.

Coming to every one of the 16 sessions and being on time

are important elements of the class. Melissa Burke, a GA participant, took that commitment seriously. Jan Hogle, GA facilitator, recalled the incident: "One day, Melissa was absent, and everyone was concerned. This was not like her. Finally she arrived, twenty minutes late, flopped into her chair, breathless, her hair still wet, and embarrassed and apologetic for her tardiness. Melissa, clearly agitated, explained her delay: 'I was all dressed for class, and went out to feed the chickens. The cat scared the chickens, who flew into the pig pen. I went into the pig pen to retrieve the chickens and fell down, getting covered with muck! So then I had to re-shower and re-dress for the class.' The

entire class applauded Melissa for her outstanding demonstration of commitment," Jan concluded.

God's Faithfulness Never Ends

Ellen Richardson overflows with God's love and is anxious to share one of her many stories of His faithfulness to everyone she sees. Her regular mentor is Ellen Beck, and she has such appreciation for Ellen and her encouragement during the months she has been an Agape client.

Ellen Richardson says, "God has worked in my life in tremen-

dous ways. My mother passed away before I was 12 years old, and my dad left at 3 years. My mom had a stroke and could not walk for a long time. My older sister raised all three of us. When I was about 11 years old, my older sister began attending some camp meetings. She asked the preacher to come and pray for mother. He prayed for mom and she got up out of that bed and walked. It was at that point that I put my trust in the Lord.

"I was blessed with five children. My only son nearly died at 6 weeks old and I called the same preacher that prayed for my mother. He came from Christiansburg to the hospital in Roanoke where he prayed for my son. Thank God my son is still with me today. I have had cancer, several heart attacks, lung cancer, and pneumonia. About four years ago, the doctors came into my

hospital room and told me I was dying. I looked at them and I told them that I was not dying because God was not ready for me; I'm not going anywhere until He's ready for me. I could go on with so many stories in my life...blessed me so many times." Ellen told her last mentor, Julia Keep, that she is now ready to see Jesus. "Anytime He wants to take me, I am ready to go!"

Ellen continued, "I want everyone to know God and how faithful he is. Coming to Agape is such an inspiration to me. I am so thankful to have Ellen (Beck, mentor) in my life. I thank God He sent Agape my way when I needed help. My advice to whoever is need to just pray and ask God to help them. He will answer and send them in the right direction."

Kent Daniel, from Moneta, grew up cutting wood with his grandfather and dad. He loves being in the woods, and has a servant's heart to serve others. His family started volunteering in Agape's pantry several years ago, and then he learned that Agape needed "woodmen". This is his fifth year of cutting and chopping wood for Agape clients. He really enjoys meeting the people who donate wood as he picks it up at their homes, and then meeting the clients who receive the wood. As Firewood Supervisor, Kent is responsible to coordinate donations of firewood with clients needing firewood.

Kent recalled a particular afternoon a couple of years ago, when the client got lost trying to find the wood storage area. His then-

fourteen year old son was with him and was a little impatient with the delay. However, "we waited and eventually the client showed up. The client told us that he was so thankful we had waited, because their wood stove was all they had for heat, and he was so concerned about his newborn baby staying warm enough through the night. That was a definite learning experience for both my son and me; we were humbled to realize what a difference a few more minutes of our time would make for that family and that baby."

Kent, who is a part of Radford Baptist Church, has served in many areas of church life, in the US Marines and for the past 22 years as a Roanoke police officer, currently as a K-9 officer. He also serves on Agape's Safety Committee, which evaluates ways to make the building more secure and safe for the volunteers and clients. Kent is a volunteer serving in the shadows, doing important work for the Kingdom of God!

As these women and heaven." their eventual husbands go through life and have more


children, Toby becomes a part of a real and loving family in which he becomes an older big brother to them all at age fifteen.
