From the Heart of a Mentor



Tracy Dunn: The Gift Is Greater Than What We Give

Over the past weeks and months that the Agape Center was closed due to the Covid pandemic, Tracy Dunn, a mentor at the Center for the past three years, found herself longing to be back with "her"

clients. Although she missed them terribly, her need to see them went beyond just the camaraderie.

Mentoring clients brings Tracy a comfort and completeness she finds difficult to fully explain other than to say, "It is my connection to God."

"I need this," she said as she spread her arms in a gesture as though embracing the entire Center. "Being here and sharing God's love with my clients keeps me from focusing on myself and my problems or past hurts and mistakes. My work here is a huge part of my life."

Besides meeting the physical needs of clients and making practical plans for the future, which includes setting goals in employment, education and training, the Agape Center also addresses individual client's spiritual needs. In fact, in the majority of cases the need for spiritual healing is far greater than the need for material things.

Volunteers, like Tracy, play such an important role. Trained by the Center, they mentor the many clients served by the Center each day. Frequently, they are able to identify with those they are mentoring because they have walked the same roads as their clients. This also helps in bonding with one another and developing trust.

Mentoring actually refreshes her, Tracy said, and fills her heart with joy and happiness. It also heals many of the scars and pains of the past. Even on those days when Tracy sees one client after another all day long she can honestly say: "I never go home exhausted or spent because my heart is full." That fullness, she knows is love.

Through experience, Tracy has learned what so many of us at the Center have learned. Any love given to others is replaced by divine love which is healing, refreshing and strengthening.

"When I'm able to pour love into a heartbroken person...I actually experience the presence of God." Tracy said, "sometimes it is so powerful it brings me to tears. And, when I invite God into the lives of heartbroken people, He always comes."

Tracy speaks for all our volunteers upon whom, as a community, we depend so greatly. In her own words, the rewards of serving God by loving all His children, is His divine love and His healing presence. "When we give, we receive," she says. Always. And, most times the gift is greater than what we have given.

> was born with Angelman Syndrome, a genetic disorder that mainly affects the nervous system. Symptoms include severe intellectual disability, development disability limited

to no functional speech, balance and movement problems. Keylie is non-verbal and physically challenged. The doctors told the family early on that Keylie probably would never be able to sit up by herself, let alone walk. Through years of all kinds of therapy, including aquatherapy and hippotherapy (equine-assisted therapy), Keylie has gained more use of her body than thought possible. And, last week, Praise the Lord, Keylie actually took her first independent steps.

She hadn't been able to come to the Agape Center the last few months because of the pandemic and her husband's recent surgery. She is glad to be back. She says, "This is my church! It's a safe haven. No one is going to hurt me here!"



Capps & Community Charity Challenge - A Huge Success!

In September, Capps Home Building Center put out a challenge to the Agape Center, Lake Christian Ministries, and SML Good Neighbors. "Raise \$100,000 among you" said owner Dave Cappellari, "and Capps will match your donation." Well the charities raised \$145,000 (\$47,000 from Agape) and, with the Capps matching funds, the Agape Center walked away with about \$90,000! (Final

expense reports are not in yet.) This provides a great boost and will enable us to continue providing for many families in need.

What is most impressive is that the friends of Agape made these donations during difficult times. The coronavirus outbreak is disrupting our daily life and there are many worthy charities competing for donations. Still, Agape supporters came through in this challenge to support our clients and volunteers.

This fundraiser was unique in several ways. First, it was much needed due to the coronavirus outbreak. Other events to raise funds have been cancelled. Second, this was the first time a local business has stepped forward to provide matching funds. Capps has been great! Lastly and most important, this was an opportunity to collaborate with two other local charities: Lake Christian Ministries and SML Good Neighbors. We all forged a positive and vital working relationship that will benefit all of us moving forward.



As part of the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has partnered with regional and local distributors whose workforces have been significantly impacted by the closure of restaurants, hotels and other food service businesses to purchase fresh food. Participating distributors and wholesalers package the pre-approved boxes of fresh fruits and vegetables and a variety of dairy and meat products for delivery to food banks, community faith-based organizations and other non-profit groups serving Americans in need.

The Agape Center recently received a shipment of 30-pound Farmers to Families Food Boxes containing a variety of items and a letter from President Trump explaining the initiative. It's not every day you get a letter from the president of the United States!
