

Answered Prayer Brings Reconciliation

Joey Brewer and his wife Chasiti have been coming to Agape since 2016 and are the first couple to take the Getting Ahead class together. He is celebrating his eighth year of sobriety from alcohol. And he is still recovering from a serious stroke suffered five years ago.

They've seen God work in many ways in their lives, and continue to look for what God still has in store for them. He says, "I've seen death (with my stroke), and it is scary. I had a lot of resentment toward God, wondering why He didn't just take me. I now see that he has a calling on my life, a purpose, and that is why He didn't take me then. He has been waiting on me to totally surrender my life to Him, so He could fulfill His purpose in me."

One of the most recent ways God interceded in Joey's life involved going through two family deaths in a matter of two weeks. One involved a close cousin, and the other involved his stepmom. Though she had been married to his dad for eighteen years, Joey wasn't really close to her. And he has been estranged from his dad for years, due to severe abuse suffered in the home.

Yet, Joey said, "I have prayed for my dad for a long time, that there would be forgiveness and the broken relationship would be mended. When my stepsister told me about her mom's death this fall, I struggled

with a decision of whether to go to the funeral. I wrestled with God. It was almost four hours to drive to North Carolina for the funeral, and I didn't feel right in my spirit about going. However, I heard God tell me I needed to go to the funeral. When I got there, I was blindsided. God showed up during the funeral and answered my prayers!

My dad approached me and said 'we need to get along and I want to fix things.' At first I questioned his sincerity, but when I felt that sense of peace, I knew that the answer I had been looking for had finally shown up. I continue to pray about it. We are staying in contact with each other since then. His health is not good, but we've had good conversations. I know what happened could only be attributed to God."

Prior to her retirement, Karen spent her career in the electric industry in communications. After retirement, she worked parttime as workshop coordinator for SCORE. (Service Core of Retired Executives) for a few years.

During one of their visits to the lake, Frank and Karen toured Agape; on that tour, Sue Lipscomb, Executive Director, said, "When you move here...". They had not considered moving here full-time until that word, which they felt was coming directly from God. They immediately started making plans for the move, and have been serving actively in their home church, EastLake Community Church, and Agape, since that time.

Karen says, "There was never a question that God sent us here to serve. We have been blessed to have so many ways to serve set before us. We are at that point in our lives where we don't have a lot of other distractions and obligations, and we can be devoted to serving our Lord. Moving here, and working at Agape, have given our lives new purpose." They have been active in their church, and initiated a community-wide GriefShare program last September, which helps individuals deal with the loss of a loved one. They and their team will continue to offer this program twice a year.

Karen will be responsible for the *Agape Newsletter* and all external communications involving the media. There are five local newspapers and one local radio station who regularly publish news about Agape, keeping our name fresh before the community. She says, "I'm looking forward to getting to know Agape and all the volunteers better. The intricacies of each department and client stories intrigue me, and I am anxious to continue presenting Agape to the community."

For the past five years, I have heard, written, and published what God is doing in this amazing ministry called Agape! It is truly the best 'job' I've ever had. It has been pure joy to be associated with, and often representing, Agape to the outside world. This ministry is the most incredible para-church organization I have personally been involved in, and I commend Sue Lipscomb and the Board for their clear enunciation of their reliance on the Holy Spirit's guidance in all matters. GETTING AHEAD PROGRAM GRADUATES SIXTH CLASS!

Nine Agape clients graduated from the sixth Getting and continue to build is our relationship with God. The concept Ahead Program (GAP) on December 9, 2020. The intensive, seventeen session class helps participants take control of their lives and encourages their relationship with Jesus Christ. Jan Hogle and Glenn Rebman co-facilitated the class; budgeting classes were offered by Ron Cordell; and nutrition classes were provided by Amanda Armstrong, Program Assistant, Family Nutrition Program of the Virginia Cooperative Extension.

At the graduation ceremony, each of the graduates shared what impacted them the most during the classes. The major themes mentioned were that the most important resource to have

of stimulus and response, and that we don't have to be reactive was an important lesson to learn. We can choose our response to what happens to us. And finally, all of the participants were grateful for the class, the friends they made, and the things they learned during the classes. Joey Brewer said, "Most people think of poverty in terms of money, but I've learned that there is more to poverty than finances. There is spiritual poverty, relationship poverty, and these are far more significant to be able to solve." Chasiti Bradbury added, "This program is so worth the effort. We have made very close, deep friendships, and that means a lot for us."



Training Leaders for Christ Homeschoolers Help




